BLUE

HAT

Well, we've made it: the New Year, and undoubtably, we all have ideas of what we'd like to see accomplished this year, whether in our own lives, the life of the church, the lives of our friends and families, the life of our nation, or in our communities. However, not all ideas will have the same sources. Some of these ideas will be purely logical, others emotional, still others flooded with pessimism or optimism, and some will be just spit-balled ideas we haven't yet fleshed out. Put another way, these ideas will be from instances of our having worn the various hats we've been talking about so far. So, the question becomes: How do we sort through all of these ideas, organize them, and make sense of all of them? This is where the sixth and final hat comes in: the Blue Hat.

When you think of this hat, I want you to think of the sky, this all-encompassing bubble that seems to hold everything together. In any given discussion, the one wearing this hat is the one in charge of the discussion, not

unlike the ringleader in a circus or the conductor of an orchestra. Charged with, essentially, thinking about thinking, the Blue Hat holds everything together. From where they sit, they look at the big picture of what needs to be discussed, how the discussion is going, where the discussion might (need to) go from its present position, etc. If/when a discussion is at an end, they bring it all together by giving a summary of what problems have been addressed, what direction the discussion seems to be taking, and any conclusions that have been reached. Perhaps more importantly, though, during the discussions themselves, the Blue Hat ensures that all hats are being worn and expressed equally. For example, if someone is abusing the Black Hat and being overly pessimistic, the Blue Hat might ask them to put on either their Yellow Hat (therein looking at the positives) or the Green Hat (therein proposing new ideas of their own) for a few minutes.

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With that said, it's worth noting that Blue Hat thinking is not a "position" so much as it is just another thought process, something all of us are capable of doing, even in our own minds.

Just as all of us are capable of using any of the five other hats, so, too, are we all capable of tapping into Blue Hat thinking. Additionally, while it sounds like the Blue Hat seems to be "large and in charge," this is not actually the case. The Blue Hat serves no purpose without the other hats to provide their input, meaning it actually is an equal to the other hats and not "over and above" the others. Think for a moment about the aspirations for the coming year I began by mentioning. I would wager that, around a month or so ago, as we saw the year wrapping up, we began spit-balling ideas about what we'd like to get done in the New Year (Green Hat). Since then, we've weighed the positives and negatives of those ideas (Yellow and Black Hats, respectively), we've surely had emotional reactions to some of those ideas (Red Hat), and maybe we've even done a little research into what the cost (s) (whether of time, energy, money, etc.) would be to bring any one of them to fruition (White Hat). So, with all these thoughts and bits of information swirling around our

minds, we need to ultimately make sense of it all, to come to some level of a conclusion, and that's where the Blue Hat comes in. By tapping into that thought process, we come to some kind of conclusion about what we will actually "resolve" to do for the New Year.

In the end, the Blue Hat brings things full-circle, both wrapping up previous steps while also initiating those next steps in our faith journey.
